EULOGY

JANE FRANCES NJOKI ANGALIA

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The late Jane Frances Njoki Angalia was born on 2 January 1966 in Thindigua. She was the first born child to the Late Wilson Angalia and the Late Mary Wangari. She was sister to George Njuguna, Agnes Wamburu, Annastaciah Wanjiku and Richard Ndungu. She was Aunt to Maryann Wamburu, Teresia Wangari, Vincent Ndungu, Morris Wamburu, Gertrude Wangari and Mitchelle Wanjiku. She was grandmother to Dave Githinji.

From an early age, Jane Frances thrived in a household where faith, family, and education were deeply valued. She quickly learned household chores and responsibilities, always with a smile that was as wide as it was sincere. Her laughter was contagious, bringing joy to all who knew her. Taught to embrace obedience, hard work, humility, generosity, and compassion, Jane Frances carried these values throughout her life, touching the hearts of everyone she encountered with her warmth and empathy.

CHURCH LIFE

Jane Frances was baptized at All Saints Catholic Parish in Riara, Kiambu, on January 8, 1966. She received her First Holy Communion and Confirmation at St. John the Baptist Church in Riruta.

A lifelong devotee, she was a dedicated parishioner at Our Lady of Consolata Shrine in Westlands, Nairobi. Her commitment to her faith deepened when she joined the Daughters of St. Paul, where she served until 1996. Jane Frances was also an active member of the Our Lady of Fatima Small Christian Community Catholic Women Association (CWA), the Synod Committee and the Catholic Justice and Peace Commission (CJPC).

EDUCATION

Jane Frances embarked on her educational journey at Kasarini Primary School and later in St. Dominic Primary Mwiki, and Muguga Green Primary School. Her secondary education began at Precious Blood Girls School, Riruta, where she studied from 1980 to 1983 and successfully completed her Kenya Certificate of Education (KCE). She then attended Loreto High School Limuru from 1984 to 1985, where she completed her Kenya Advanced Certificate of Education (KACE).

Her passion for learning propelled her into higher education at the Catholic University of Eastern Africa, where she earned a Bachelor's degree in Education from 1996 to 1999. Continuing her academic pursuits, she obtained a Master's Degree Communication from Daystar between 2000 and 2002. At the time of her passing, she was working on her PHD dissertation after having completed the course work at Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology.

WORK

Jane Frances began her professional journey teaching at Ruiru High School from 1986 to 1987. She transitioned to the banking sector, joining Barclays Bank (now Absa Bank) where she worked from 1988 to 1990. Her career then took a turn towards publishing, spending six years at Paulines Publications Africa, until 1996.

In the early 2000s, Jane Frances made significant strides in the field communications. She served as the Public Relations & Marketing Manager at Radio Waumini, under the Kenya Secretariat from 2002 to 2004. She then moved to academia as the Public Relations Officer at Masinde Muliro University of Science and Technology from 2004 to 2006. Her expertise in public service was further recognized when she took on the role of Assistant Executive Director at the Public Complaints Standing Committee (Ombudsman) – Ministry of Justice from 2008 to 2011. In 2012, she worked at the National Cohesion and Integration Commission (NCIC).

She later lectured at several prestigious institutions including Tangaza College, Masinde Muliro University, United States International University (USIU), and Jomo University of Agriculture Kenyatta Technology (JKUAT). She was a researcher, rapporteur and complied numerous reports, organizations such as the Complaints Standing Committee, People for Peace, Public Universities Inspection Board, Liverpool among others. She was also a member of Professional bodies like Public Relations Society of Kenya (PRSK), Association of Media Women in Kenya (AMWIK), World Association of Christian Communicators. Union of Catholic Journalists in Africa (UCAP -KENYA CHAPTER). She was a member to charitable organizations including Soroptimist CUEA-FOGEE, International. Franciscan International Association the Rotary Club, among many other social organizations.

ILLNESS AND TRANSITION

Jane Frances's journey through illness began in 2014 when she was diagnosed with breast cancer at Aga Khan Hospital. Though the news came as a shock, she faced it with remarkable courage, starting her treatment journey without hesitation. Over the next ten years, Jane was treated in various hospitals, including Aga Khan, KU Teaching and Referral, and MP Shah and others in Kenya, as well as BLK and Apollo Hospitals in India. She bravely endured chemotherapy, multiple surgeries, radiotherapy, and immunotherapy, always facing each new challenge with faith and resilience

Even as she fought her own battle, Jane Frances never wavered in her commitment to helping others. Between treatments, she continued to serve and support fellow cancer patients, sharing hope and encouragement with everyone around her. In August 2023, she was admitted to Nairobi Hospital, and soon after, traveled back to India for further treatment and returned home in April 2024.



In August 2024 she travelled back to India for a long planned HIPEC surgery. However, other complications had to be managed before the surgery. Though she fought with all her strength, her condition did not improve, and on the morning of October 18, 2024, she went to be with the Lord. Psalm 30:2 "O Lord my God, I cried to you for help, and you have healed me." We find peace in knowing that Jane now rests in God's arms.

Her life is a testament to John 5:24:

"Very truly I tell you, whoever hears my word and believes him who sent me has eternal life and will not be judged but has crossed over from death to life."

Her remarkable life cannot be fully captured in words, but her legacy of love, faith, and courage will live on in all who knew her.
